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

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True Charitable Giving

by William Law

I shall only produce one remarkable passage of Scripture, which is sufficient to justify all that I have said concerning this religious use of all our fortune.

"When the Son of man shall come in his glory, and all the holy angels with him, then shall he sit upon the throne of his glory: and before him shall be gathered all nations: and he shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divides his sheep from the goats: and he shall set the sheep on his right hand, but the goats on the left. Then shall the King say unto them on his right hand, Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world: for I was an hungered,

and ye gave me meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger, and ye took me in: naked, and ye clothed me: I was sick, and ye visited me: I was in prison, and ye came unto me . . . Then shall he say unto them on the left hand, Depart from me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels: for I was an hungered, and ye gave me no meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me no drink: I was a stranger, and ye took me not in: naked, and ye clothed me not: sick, and in prison, and ye visited me not. These shall go away into everlasting punishment: but the righteous into life eternal."

[Matt. xxv. 31-64]

I have quoted this passage at length, because if one looks at the way of the world, one would hardly think that Christians had ever read this part of Scripture. For what is there in the lives of Christians, that looks as if their salvation depended upon these good works? And yet the necessity of them is here asserted in the highest manner, and pressed upon us by a lively description of the glory and terrors of the day of judgment.

Some people, even of those who may be reckoned virtuous Christians, look upon this text only as a general recommendation of occasional works of charity; whereas it shows the necessity not only of occasional charities now and then, but the necessity of such an entire charita-ble life, as is a continual exercise of all such works of charity, as we are able to perform.

You own, that you have no title to salvation, if you have neglected these good works; because such persons as have neglected them are, at the last day, to be placed on the left hand, and banished with a "Depart, ye cursed." There is, therefore, no salvation but in the performance of these good works. Who is it, therefore, that may be said to have performed these good works? Is it he that has some time assisted a prisoner, or relieved the poor or sick? This would be as absurd as to say, that he had performed the duties of devotion, who had sometime said his prayers. Is it, therefore, he that has several times done these works of chari-ty? This can no more be said, than he can be said to be the truly just man, who had done acts of justice several times. What is the rule, therefore, or measure of performing these good works? How shall a man trust that he performs them as he ought?

Now the rule is very plain and easy, and such as is common to every other virtue, or good temper, as well as to charity. Who is the humble, or meek, or devout, or just, or faithful man? Is it he that has several times done acts of humility, meekness, devotion, justice, or fi-delity? No; but it is he that lives in the habitual exercise of these virtues. In like manner, he only can be said to have performed these works of charity, who lives in the habitual exercise of them to the utmost of his power. He only has performed the duty of Divine love, who loves God with all his heart, and with all his mind, and with all his strength. And he only has per-formed the duty of these good works, who has done them with all his heart, and with all his mind, and with all his strength. For there is no other measure of our doing good, than our power of doing it.

The Apostle St. Peter puts this question to our blessed Saviour: "Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times? Jesus saith unto him, I say not un-to thee, Until seven times, but, Until seventy times seven." [Matt. xviii. 21, 22] Not as if after this number of offences a man might then cease to forgive; but the expression of seventy times seven, is to show us, that we are not to bound our forgiveness by any number of offences, but are to continue forgiving the most repeated offences against us. Thus our Sav-iour saith in an-

other place, "If he trespass against thee seven times in a day, and seven times in a day turn again to thee, saying, I repent; you shalt forgive him." [Luke xvii. 4] If, therefore, a man ceases to forgive his brother, because he has forgiven him often already; if he excuses himself from forgiving this man, because he has forgiven several others; such a one breaks this law of Christ, concerning the forgiving one's brother.

Now the rule of forgiving is also the rule of giving; you are not to give, or do good to seven, but to seventy times seven. You are not to cease from giving, because you have given often to the same person, or to other persons; but must look upon yourself as [15] much obliged to continue relieving those that continue in want, as you were obliged to relieve them once or twice. Had it not been in your power, you had been excused from relieving any per-son once; but if it is in your power to relieve people often, it is as much your duty to do it often, as it is the duty of others to do it but seldom, because they are but seldom able. He that is not ready to forgive every brother, as often as he wants to be forgiven, does not for-give like a disciple of Christ. And he that is not ready to give to every brother that wants to have something given him, does not give like a disciple of Christ. For it is as necessary to give to seventy times seven, to live in the continual exercise of all good works to the utmost of our power, as it is necessary to forgive until seventy times seven, and live in the habitual exercise of this forgiving temper, towards all that want it.

And the reason of all this is very plain, because there is the same goodness, the same ex-cellency, and the same necessity of being thus charitable at one time as at another. It is as much the best use of our money, to be always doing good with it, as it is the best use of it at any particular time; so that that which is a reason for a charitable action, is as good a reason for a charitable life. That which is a reason for forgiving one offence, is the same reason for forgiving all offences. For such charity has nothing to recommend it to-day, but what will be the same recommendation of it to-morrow; and you cannot neglect it at one time, without being guilty of the same sin, as if you neglected it at another time.

As sure, therefore, as these works of charity are necessary to salvation, so sure is it that we are to do them to the utmost of our power; not today, or to-morrow, but through the whole course of our life. If, therefore, it be our duty at any time to deny ourselves any needless expenses, to be moderate and frugal, that we may have to give to those that want, it is as much our duty to do so at all times, that we may be further able to do more good. For if it is at any time a sin to prefer needless vain expense to works of charity, it is so at all times; because charity as much excels all needless and vain expenses at one time as at an-other. So that if it is ever necessary to our salvation, to take care of these works of charity, and to see that we make ourselves in some degree capable of doing them, it is as necessary to our salvation, to take care to

make ourselves as capable as we can be, of performing them in all the parts of our life. Either, therefore, you must so far renounce your Christianity, as to say that you need never perform any of these good works; or you must own that you are to perform them all your life in as high a degree as you are able. There is no middle way to be taken, any more than there is a middle way betwixt pride and humility, or temperance and intemperance. If you do not strive to fulfill

all charitable works, if you neglect any of them that are in your power, and deny assistance to those that want what you can give, let it be when it will, or where it will, you number yourself amongst those that want Christian charity. Because it is as much your duty to do good with all that you have, and to live in the continual exercise of good works, as it is your duty to be temperate in all that you eat and drink.






Defined Discipleship Training

They have no financial sponsors except individuals who are moved to send via Western Union but no monthly support from any church or organization. They depend on the food they grow. They are currently trying to purchase the land on which they rent their housing facilities. They have turned part of their facilities into a school since they can't afford to take their kids to different schools because they have no money to pay the fees for outside schools. Results of June 2017 Trip To Uganda

As the Lord continues to work in His wonderful and Divine ways the trip to Uganda became a reality and very fruitful.

The doors that have opened and the path that has been presented is clear and much progress has been made on so many projects.

- We are looking at 4 acres of land to expand the school and orphanage
- Delivered 10 (3 tiered) metal beds and 20 desks (that will be made locally) for the school/orphanage
- Have arranged for a Mission Conference to unit four countries (Rwanda, Africa, Kenya, Uganda) in January 2018
- Looking at four acres of land for expansion of the school/orphanage; currently Homeland is leasing where they are and the landlord will not make any repairs, conditions are deplorable
- Will be sponsoring a Friday evening Christian radio program, this is vital to the growth of the Grace Fellowship church which is now four years old. Membership continues to grow and the Wednesday evening bible study is up to 50 plus members. We will sending 100 bibles to them

- The children were delighted with the bracelets (made by guest at Lena's House for elderly) and candy we handed out. Such a treat for them
- Discussions with ladies groups to make African jewelry to sell in the US, they will need a small catalog and on-line store. This will serve as another income stream as they work towards self-sustainability
- Cultivating four acres of land for food, brick making production that they lease are also methods of self-sustainability. > There is talk to also begin to raise chickens and possibly make furniture to add to the diversity of the income stream
- Prayer request were many and we need to diligently pray for them

Understanding Why We Need To Love Our Neighbor

The lord has called to the greatest commandment through Matthew 22: 36-40: "you shall love the Lord God with all your heart; with all your soul and with all your mind" This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: you shall love your neighbor as yourself.

We read here that this is His greatest call for us to love. Notice Christ has not called is to love those that are like us, in other words: Is it not so much easier to love those that are in your family, of your religious affiliation, the same race, gender etc?

Rather Christ is calling you to love all persons. A neighbor would be any person we are to see, speak to, or be in contact with. Ask yourself this; "Can I love a white supremist who hates blacks, who wishes to kill still hang those because of

race? Well can you? Can love a murder, or a man that murdered your son or daughter? Can you love your daughters ex-husband, your son's ex wife? Is it not easy to love those in which we love and accept like us? Yet thought our little country hate prevails. Hate tends to conquer the voice in the media. Love those that hate you, and forgive those that prosecute you.

Christ forgave you and Christ loves you even though you are so so weary, so sinful. Who are you not to love all. All souls that incarnated onto this planet are born in the same image of God who presided over us all.

Do not separate yourself from others but learn to love them. Weep for them as Christ has wept for you. Show them love. Remember Christ is calling you: in John 14:12 Christ says "Most Assuredly, I say to you, He who believes in me, the works that I do he will do also, and greater works than there he will do, because I go to my father... If you love me, keep my commandments.

So Christ continues to yearn for you to love, you are set apart as his follower. You must come into a deeper, abiding relationship in which you weep for those that are not in his protection. Go the Lord in your quiet time and ask "Lord how many I love others more?" Remove from the iniquity, the pride, the sin that separates me not only from you, but from others. Lord show me how to get myself apart from this world and love others as you will for me.

Remember it is this relationship you have with and in Christ that is go vital, that none other is important. Soon you will exit this scene, this realm and then what? Do you love as Christ loves you? Oh, can you think your so righteous when soon you will be gone? "how can the spirit of a mortal be proud" you can not even save yourself from death — not one "Thing" or the planet is yours; not even your body. Therefore, Seek A deeper repentance and learn to love all persons for they like you are from God. They, like you, are sinful and pitiful just as we are all.

Pray with the man or woman that the holy spirit prompts you to the next time you are in the grocery store. Do not ignore the promotion of the Holy Spirit! 

Behind The Walls

Behind the Walls In 1985, Braman began to witness his recovery from addiction in the New York State Correctional Facilities. Braman has presented programs since that time in many facilities including: Greenhaven, Fishkill, Downstate, Summit, and several local and county jails. It is a thorough program using the 12 step method of recovery, Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and Meditation techniques as well as a program for dealing with violent behavior. In addition, our program helps to provide clarification concerning the negative learned behavior that unfortunately comes out of some families.

Life Line

The Life-Line is a continuation of Braman Foundation of Charities. This program, when instituted, will enable any individual being released from a facility the opportunity to be united with a home church and a contact person in their home area. In addition, we will offer a mentoring program.

An inmate's most vulnerable time, whether they know this or not, is when they are released from incarceration. Months and years, depending on one's sentencing of forced incarceration are now dissolved. An individual is now "FREE", or at least they may think they are free; however, New York state statistics show that out of approximately every 100 inmates that are released, 78 come back into the



prison system in some form. What can be done for the individual who wishes to change? The individual must truly have a change of heart. We can extend our hand!

We believe the most critical even for the individual being released from captivity is the first 24-48 hours after their release. Our Life-Line Ministry is designed to help eliminate the lure of temptation to backslide. If an individual so desires, we will help them find a home church and a friend or mentor upon their release.

This is a "grass roots" effort. The request obviously must be generated from the individual while they are still incarcerated. They are given a Request for Pre-Release Contact Form. They turn the form into the counselor's office at the facility. At that time, the prison will contact our ministry. We will then contact a church in their home neighborhood. Finally, we will give the information to the individual several days before they are released.

BFC Has Partnered With Full Life Crusade in Haiti

Full Life Crusade's Haitian Mission program is now being offered in Haiti. We support the mission for revival in Haiti. Please consider making a tax-deductible donation or participating in our pen pal program. We are now conducting our Rescue Mission program in Haiti as well, sending bags containing protein bars, life straws, and other supplies.







In 1965, Full Life Crusade was founded out of necessity. It began when Wesley Smith, a 26-year-old school teacher from Flint, Michigan, began leading many of his students to the Lord. These students began taking the good news of Jesus Christ into the streets. Wes rented a store front building where they could all meet along with other adults for Bible studies. He began to feel God call-ing him to preach the gospel. He married soon afterward and started financially supporting his father-in-law, George Clérié, who was a pastor in the country of Haiti. Pastor Clérié had been preaching and pastoring in Haiti for 30 years, starting 14 churches, 5 schools, and leading nearly 10,000 people to Christ. When he died, Wes quit his job and began taking groups of people to Haiti to ex-pose them to the needs there. These were the simple beginnings of Full Life Crusade.



Overcoming The Effects Of Materialism

Definition: The belief that one's possessions, money, and physical comfort are more important than spiritual values.

Supporting scripture: Romans 12:2: "Do not be conformed to the patterns of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind"

Today, All around we are witnessing in our church the yearning for nicer homes, greater wealth, newer automobiles etc, etc, etc. For decades pastors, and ministers have told us "Do not worry it is the love of money that is the problem. Having nice possessions, is fine." And yet what is in our hearts: Do you get more excited about a new car, the college education of your child, The pride you feel of your new home more than your relationship with Christ?

The root of this desire is in the illusion that there nice, Things or this nice lifestyle will somehow bring happiness. We become attached to a new car, a new sofa, an antique etc more than our relationship with Christ. A rather shallow isn't it?

Stats back there facts up: among "so called" Christians there is no difference in divorce rate or bankruptcy's versus the secular world or non believers. Search the web yourself, but ask yourself this: Have I become a victim of this worldliness? Do I strive to satisfy my inner desire for more material "things" Than I do for abiding more with Jesus?

Materialism, of course, is not our only issue, yet we must explore this and someone how quail our inner desire for more, more, and more. Do you not have enough? Remember Christ has told us; "We can not serve two masters, for we will hate one and love the other. We can not serve God and mammon"

Do you frequently say to your friends "look what God has given me, a new car, a new house how beautiful." Yet examine your heart: Is this not self disguising itself in God's grace. Are not really saying "I am so blessed, I am so good I am the great I am."

Will Christ ask you when you pass from this life "Good and faithful servany you have accumulated a lot of worth, you left a fortune to your family, you lived so well? No, of course not, Yet we tend to

strive as if we think we will be more satisfied if we only had this, or that or could life this way or that way etc.

The parable in Luke Chapter 16: 19-31 "there was a certain rich man who was clothed in purple and fine linen and fared sumptuously everyday. But there was a certain began named Lazarus, full of sores, who was laid at his gate,

desiring to be fed with the crumbs that fell from the rich man's table. More our dogs came and licked his scars. So it was that the beggar died, and was carried by the angels to Abraham's bosom. The rich man also died and was buried. And being in torments in Hades. He lifted up his eyes and saw Abraham a far off, and Lazarus in his bosom. Then he cried out and said; Father Abraham have mercy on me and send Lazarus

that he may dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am tormented in this flame: but Abraham said "Son remember that in your life you received good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things bit how he is comforted and you are tor-

mented and besides this there is a great gulf fixed, so that those who want to pass from here to you con not nor can those there pass to us."

My friends do not forget that soon you will leave this life. Are you prepared? Or do you believe you will live forever? You will move on, but where is up to you. Learn to be in this world but not of it!

The Sermons of Richard W. Braman





